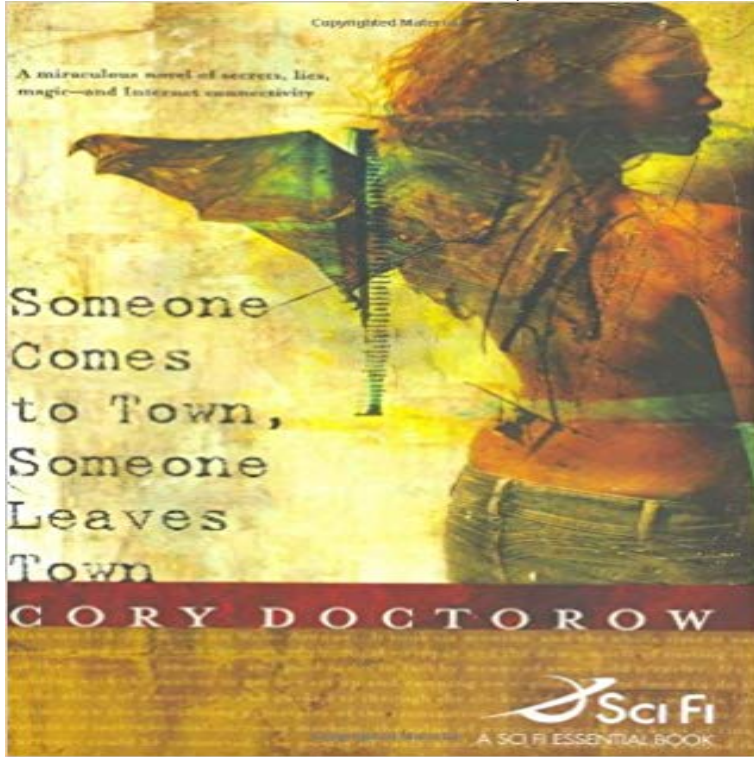


# Someone Comes to Town, Someone Leaves Town
